Uzbekistan has long been known as a center of ancient culture along the Silk Road, and is now on the rise as an incubator for contemporary arts. The city of Bukhara was named a UNESCO Creative City of Crafts and Folk Art in 2023, and later this year it will host Central Asia's first major international art gathering, the Bukhara Biennial. In a rare commitment to local talent, all of the works presented at the Biennial will be produced in the country.
